



June Outing to Piddington Roman Villa

We went to the Piddington Roman Villa, Chapel End, Piddington, NN7 2DD,

for our annual June outing. The village of Piddington is tucked away down a dead-end, on the road to Northampton between Horton and Hackleton. Follow the brown signs to find the Museum. The Museum is housed in an old Wesleyan Chapel built in 1851.

Unfortunately the weather was not on our side with lots of rain before



the event, so it wasn't safe to go to the archaelogical dig site to see the actual remains. However, Roy and Liz Friendship-Taylor did us proud with the evening. Sixteen members attended the event, so we split into 2 groups of eight. Liz took the group I was in upstairs first for tea and an explanation of what the site was about.



Roy took the second group on a tour of the artefacts in the downstairs room. We then swapped over. A great evening was had by all the people I spoke to. Although a small Museum, it was packed with very interesting artefacts, all laid out in a very accessible way. Well worth a visit.

The brochure they gave us states the following:

"The Museum displays tell the story of the Piddington site, based on the evidence from the excavations. They show how people lived - what their houses were like, what they are, the animals they kept, the crops they grew and the games they played."

There is also a small, but well-stocked Museum shop, which offers popular and academic books, souvenirs, T-shirts, sweatshirts, quality replicas and a range of attractive and affordable items for children.

As we were not able to go the site, Roy and Liz have offered the members who attended on 11 June free entry to their Open Day on Saturday 17 August. Anyone else is welcome to go along but will need to pay £5. Normal opening times for the Museum are Wednesdays, 10-12 am and 2-4 pm. Check first on the day at 01604 870312 or 01604 871266. It also opens on Sunday Afternoons - 1 October to 31 March, 2 pm to 4 pm, 1 April to 30 September, 2 pm to 5 pm.
